1. **Kirk, Richard.** *Façade: How public-private partnerships undermine public and affordable housing*. Proposal submitted to University of California Press.

- *Façade* examines how public-private partnerships (PPPs) have transformed housing policy in the United States over the past three decades. The book argues that federal programs promoted as community revitalization strategies in fact dismantled traditional public housing while embedding private profit-making logics into housing governance. What results is not only the redistribution of resources upward—from communities to private developers—but also a transfer of risk onto the state and residents themselves. Drawing on research in South Central Los Angeles alongside comparative case studies across the country, the book situates housing policy within broader processes of financialization, privatization, and racial capitalism.
